Woodridge Hills Neighborhood Watch Meeting Recap October 6, 2007

There were approximately 30 people in attendance at the October 6 Woodridge Hills Neighborhood Watch meeting.

District project manager Bill Chavez described the overall Upper Northwest Interceptor (UNWI) program and how UNWI 9 fits into it. Different methods of construction were reviewed and the selected drilling method was explained.

Chavez also outlined the construction schedule with the audience. Area traffic control was described, including the use of flaggers for traffic controls rather than the temporary traffic signals initially planned.

Two men in the audience complimented the project and how things were being handled. They expressed satisfaction with the minimal impacts from the project, taking into consideration the size of the equipment being used and the narrow roads in the construction area. Chavez indicated that the Traffic Control Plan (TCP) was successful due to the use of flaggers 24 hours a day, seven days a week and the presence of Citrus Heights police.

A special mention was given by the Woodridge Hills Neighborhood Watch president to Mike Garcia, one of the project's public outreach consultants, for responding to his meeting request and providing helpful information.
